A regular meeting of the Town Board was held on Wednesday, September 8, 2010, at the LaGrange Town Hall, 120 Stringham Road. Supervisor Wagner called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. The Deputy Town Clerk led the flag salute.

Supervisor Wagner requested a motion to accept the minutes from August 25, 2010. Councilman Luna so moved; seconded by Councilman Jessup; carried unanimously.

Supervisor Wagner requested a motion to accept the minutes from the special meeting held on September 1, 2010. Councilman Jessup so moved; seconded by Councilman O'Hare; carried unanimously.

Deputy Supervisor Luna requested a motion to accept the monthly reports for August, 2010. Councilman O'Hare so moved; seconded by Councilman Luna; carried unanimously.

**Supervisor's Report**

Supervisor Wagner reported that it was discussed at the Dutchess County Supervisors and Mayors Meeting that they remain steadfast and will continue to let their concerns be known to

the Legislature that pass downs are not acceptable to 100% of the Mayors and Supervisors. They will once again let the Legislature know that that is their feeling. Supervisor Wagner stated that he has been meeting with the Chairman of the Legislature for the last few weeks and will try to continue to do so to keep the lines of communication open. One of the differences of opinions remains that the alleged windfall that municipalities are going to see, as a result of the exemption on clothing under \$110.00 being lifted, will be enough to pay the charge back from the Board of Education. Supervisor Wagner stated that the Town budgeted \$640,000.00 last year for sales tax; the Town purposely budgeted low on purpose because that is the wise thing to do, especially in bad economic times. The Town will probably get more than \$640,000.00 and that will be revenue that we can reuse; it will be a windfall that LaGrange should be able to spend. The Supervisors and Mayors believe that the Legislature should not be helping us to spend the revenue.

Supervisor Wagner reported that also at the Supervisors and Mayors meeting yesterday, he wished to commend the Deputy Town Clerk, Margaret Schmitz, for putting on a presentation to the Mayors and Supervisors regarding the NYS Agriculture & Markets decision to no longer be in the business of registering dogs, turning that responsibility over to the municipalities. Mrs. Schmitz came and gave a very good presentation on what that transition means and what laws will need to be put in place. Supervisor Wagner advised the Town Board that they will have to get on a fast track, with the Clerk's Office help, to put a law in place for LaGrange. There will be some decisions to make over the next few weeks.

### **Correspondence**

Supervisor Wager stated that notifications of programming changes have been received from both Time Warner Cable and Cablevision. These will be on file in the Town Clerk's Office for two weeks.

### **Agenda Items**

#### **Resolution**

Supervisor Wagner introduced a resolution to waive the 30 day waiting period for liquor license for Emmett Mahoney's at Gold's Gym, 258 Titusville Road. Councilman Jessup moved to approve the resolution; seconded by Councilman Beck; carried unanimously. (SEE ADDENDUM)

Supervisor Wagner introduced a resolution to waive the 30 day waiting period for liquor license for Chef Ciccio's Restaurant, 702 Freedom Plains Road. Councilman O'Hare moved to approve the resolution; seconded by Councilman Beck; carried unanimously. (SEE ADDENDUM)

Supervisor Wagner stated that the Public Hearing for the Harvest Ridge Subdivision Drainage District will need to be rescheduled. Ms. Livigni handed out a revised map, plan and report. Councilman O'Hare moved to reschedule the Public Hearing for September 22, 2010; seconded by Councilman Jessup; carried unanimously.

Due to not receiving the resolution prior to setting up the public hearing, this public hearing will need to be rescheduled at the September 22, 2010 Town Board Meeting.

### **Resolution**

Supervisor Wagner stated that the Board had a discussion regarding employment in the Town Clerk's Office and decided to make the position of Deputy Town Clerk, full-time. Supervisor Wagner stated that the Board received compelling information from the Clerk and her deputies and requested a motion to approve this position change to full-time. Councilman Luna so moved; seconded by Councilman Jessup; carried unanimously.

Supervisor Wagner stated the Board is happy to welcome back the Town Clerk, who returned yesterday after a lengthy illness; she looks good and seems happy to be back. Supervisor Wagner stated that the Town has been very fortunate to have Mrs. Schmitz fill in so professionally.

### **Resolution**

Supervisor Wagner stated that the Building Inspector is requesting the Town Board approve a performance bond in the amount of \$5,000.000 for Burnham Building, 35 Patrick Lane. He explained that this bond is from John Page Jr. to insure that the life safety devices will be installed as required, per the fire inspection performed on September 9, 2010. Councilman O'Hare moved to approve the performance bond; seconded by Councilman Luna; carried unanimously.

Supervisor Wagner stated that the Highway Superintendent is requesting the Town Board's authorization to go out to bid for highway materials and road sweeping. Councilman Jessup moved to approve the request; seconded by Councilman O'Hare; carried unanimously.

Supervisor Wagner stated that Vassar Brothers Foundation is requesting Town Board approval to use town roads for their 2<sup>nd</sup> annual triathlon on September 11, 2010, held at Freedom Park. Councilman Luna moved to approve their request; seconded by Councilman Beck; carried unanimously.

**Recreation Report** – no report

### **Open Space**

Councilman Jessup reported that the Open Space Committee is waiting for the conservation easement. He spoke with Jen Cherry, at Dutchess Land Conservancy, and gave her a number in which the Town is trying to negotiate as the purchase of the Sleight property. Councilman Jessup stated that Ms. Cherry would like to meet with Supervisor Wagner, and the

representatives of DLC sometime next week to work on finalizing that purchase before the end of the year.

## **Highway**

Councilman Jessup reported that Michael Kelly's one issue that really needs to be addressed is the salt shed. The Board may consider going to bonding or making some kind of temporary repairs to the existing salt shed. Councilman Jessup stated that is something that needs to be addressed sooner, rather than later.

Councilman Luna questioned if the Board has every been presented with a price on only a salt shed for only the amount of salt we currently need to store for that location. Councilman Beck answered, "No."

Supervisor Wagner stated that what needs to be decided is whether the Board wants to repair or replace the salt shed. D.E.C. wants something done. The Supervisor expressed that he feels the least expensive way is to replace it with a fabric building. Supervisor Wagner stated that previous estimates included areas for plows, and was in the \$1.5 million dollar range. Councilman Jessup stated that Mr. Kelly has called several places for estimates to replace the shed, and no one had gotten back to him. Supervisor Wagner asked Councilman Jessup to work with Mr. Kelly to obtain an estimated price for repairs, and estimated price for replacing the shed, and a price on a fabric building.

Councilman Luna stated that the Town does not want another salt shed similar to the one that is there now. Supervisor Wagner clarified that he is requesting a price for a salt shed similar in size and stick built. Councilman Jessup stated that the repairs to the existing shed would be about \$5,000.00 for materials. Ms. Livigni added that is just for the materials; the guys at Highway would perform the work.

Councilman Beck stated that he does not have a problem with the guys doing some minor work, but when it comes to major projects, he feels it should go out to bid. He added that otherwise, it takes away from the time they should be out maintaining the highway.

Supervisor Wagner stated it is a multi-step process. First the Town needs to zero in on prices, zero in on choices; then it needs to find out what the D.E.C. will accept. Councilman Luna stated that any repair would have to last more than six months. Councilman Jessup stated that the real problem with the salt shed is the walls popping out. Supervisor Wagner suggested that Councilman Jessup obtain the D.E.C. advisory letter; as their concern is with the salt leaching into the ground water. Ms. Livigni added that the temporary fix that Mr. Kelly is speaking about is so the shed can at least hold salt and not be losing it because there are holes all around where the slat leaks out. She added that the \$5,000.00 will be just to keep the salt in the shed; just a quick fix to get him through the winter.

## **Town Board**

Supervisor Wagner stated that on the topic of open space, the Board needs to spend some time as a board and with the attorney trying to figure out whether the Town has enough teeth in the conservation easements that are part of developments. The building inspector comes to him to let him know that someone in a subdivision is marking trees and getting ready to clear cut areas in those conservation easements. Many times people do not know they have these conservation easements, and after some time they want to expand their reach and they want to install a pool, or a shed and they have a conservation easement, sometime effecting drainage, maybe near wetlands. Supervisor Wagner stated that the Building Inspector has told him that he doesn't feel there is good comfort level for enforcement. Supervisor Wagner questioned if the Town should redraft these easements so it is very clear how those easements are handled. Mr. Blass stated that typically treble damages (three times the value of the trees) is standard for removal of trees, attorney fees for enforcement, as well as slapping a lien on the property to raise enough revenue. Supervisor Wagner stated that he understands from Walter Artus that there is to be permanent concrete markers at the intersection of every sideline of the easement. Supervisor Wagner stated he just wants to be sure there are enough teeth in the legislation to try to avoid the eventuality that all of a sudden all the trees have been taken down and there becomes drainage problems.

Councilman Beck asked if a notice can be placed in the tax bills of people in those conservation easements because they change hands all the time. Councilman Luna asked if there is some notification given at the time of the closing or expressed by disclosure by the realtor about the easements. Mr. Blass mentioned that these easements would be included in the title report. Mr. Blass suggested the possibility of putting the conservation easement in the deed. Ms. Livigni stated that another issue to consider, aside from the conservation easements, is the fact that there is not a clear cutting ordinance on the books to prevent someone from clearing all the way to the property line; which could have ramifications to other neighboring parcels. Ms. Livigni offered the suggestion of a vegetative buffer between properties, within certain criteria. Supervisor Wagner asked Mr. Blass to look into this.

## **Town Attorney – no report**

## **Administrator of Public Works**

## **Public Comment**

Ms. Livigni stated that she distributed to the Board a letter from Greg Bolner at Clark Patterson Lee recommending a bid award for the former Titusville Sewer District Waste Water Treatment Plant. Ms. Livigni stated that the low bidder was Coyle Industries, Inc., at \$37,600.00 and is well within the construction estimate. Ms. Livigni explained that she and Greg Bolner met with the contractor, on the site, to make sure he fully understood the scope of work and the fact that he would be held to this estimate and that it must be done by the end of this calendar year. Ms. Livigni stated that the contractor had no problem with that at all. Ms. Livigni recommended this bid for award.

Supervisor Wagner asked if the contractor knows that the Town is not interested in change orders. Ms. Livigni stated that he does understand that. Councilman Luna asked if the Town has any ramifications if he comes in with a change order. Ms. Livigni stated change orders can be denied. Ms. Livigni stated that she cannot guarantee that he won't find anything in the ground that would modify the scope of the job. Ms. Livigni stated that she is trying to get this to the point where D.E.C. will accept that the Town has decommissioned this plant. Councilman Luna made a motion to award the contract to Coyle Industries, Inc.; seconded by Councilman Beck; carried unanimously.

### **Environmental Consultants – no report**

Councilman O'Hare made a motion to open the meeting up to public comment; seconded by Councilman Jessup; carried unanimously.

Allison Withers, LaGrange Library Board, reported that she has given Mrs. Schmitz the Library Newsletter for public display. Ms. Withers pointed out that the last page of the newsletter gives information about the Library Card Discount program which offers library card holders a discount at various businesses in the area when presenting their library card. Also on the back page of the newsletter is an application form to become a Friend of the LaGrange Library.

Ms. Withers stated that last week she submitted to the Town Clerk's Office, the Library petitions. Ms. Withers asked if this will be on the Town Board agenda at some point. Mr. Blass stated that he is handling that matter, and the way that he reads the statute and commentary, there really is no need expressly for Town Board action, and the Town Clerk is basically a conduit of the material to the Board of Elections. Mr. Blass stated that to be on the safe side, if the Board is willing, they can do an oral resolution authorizing the Town Clerk to carry forth her mandatory duties under the Education Law and the Election Law with respect to this matter. That would close up the Town Board loop hole that probably doesn't exist.

### **Resolution**

Supervisor Wagner asked Mr. Blass to clarify how the minutes should read. Mr. Blass stated that the gist of the resolution is that the Town has received from the LaGrange Library Association a petition bearing signatures in support of a referendum under section 259 of the Education Law reading as follows:

SHALL THE ANNUAL CONTRIBUTION OF THE TOWN OF LAGRANGE FOR THE OPERATING BUDGET OF THE LAGRANGE ASSOCIATION LIBRARY BE INCREASED BY NINETY NINE THOUSAND, SEVEN HUNDRED AND TWENTY DOLLARS (\$99,720) TO THE SUM OF SIX HUNDRED AND NINETY NINE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$699,000) ANNUALLY?

The statute states that upon receipt of these petitions, with adequate signatures, the Town shall pass this petition on to the Board of Elections for the purposes of putting the referendum on the general election ballot. And, the Town Clerk, under Election Law § 4-108, simply certifies the receipt of this material and sends it on to the Board of Elections.

Mr. Blass further explained to the Board that the gist of the resolution is to acknowledge receipt of this material and to give its blessing to the Town Clerk to take the steps required by statute to get the referendum on the ballot.

Councilman Jessup moved to approve the resolution; seconded by Councilman O'Hare, carried unanimously.

Councilman Jessup wished to clarify that the Town Board is not endorsing this proposition; rather just passing it on. Mr. Blass confirmed that the Town is simply a conduit. Councilman Luna offered a motion to make Councilman Jessup's statement a part of the motion; seconded by Councilman O'Hare; carried unanimously.

Supervisor Wagner asked Ms. Withers if the Library Board wishes to hold a public information session here at a Town Board Meeting. Ms. Withers stated that perhaps they would, although she is not prepared to answer with any certainty. Ms. Withers mentioned that she thought there was a time limit for filing the petition with the Board of Elections. Supervisor Wagner replied that it is 36 days before November 2, 2010; confirmed by Mr. Blass.

Supervisor Wagner stated that Ms. Withers can get back to the Board with a date that would work well for the Library Board, and perhaps they may wish to schedule a repeat performance when people are at the Public Hearing for the budget.

Carl Valentino, Arthursburg Road, asked who is responsible for ensuring the signatures are valid. Mr. Blass stated that would be the responsibility of the Board of Elections. Councilman Luna stated that any resident could challenge any petition.

Mr. Valentino, asked how the community knows that the petition can be challenged?

Supervisor Wagner stated that most people do not know they can challenge a petition. He added that it is the Town Clerk's responsibility to verify that there are enough signatures on the petition based on the last Governor's election in the Town of LaGrange. The petition has 960 or so signatures, with numerous cross-outs and they needed 500 and something. There doesn't appear to be anywhere in the statute that states the Town Clerk needs to verify the signatures.

Ms. Withers stated that the cross-outs are people who signed the petition and then realized they don't vote in the Town of LaGrange. She explained that at the end of the petitioning, the Library Board went through every signature with the voting records from the Board of Elections and verified that everyone that signed had signed only once, lives in the Town of LaGrange, and is a registered voter in the Town of LaGrange.

Mr. Blass clarified that anyone that would consider challenging the adequacy of the 900 plus signatures would do the very same thing.

Mr. Valentino asked for clarification that the Town is not verifying the signatures. Mr. Blass stated that the Town Clerk is not certifying the signatures, just passing on a document with a

certification that it is a true and accurate copy of the document. It is certifying the authenticity of the document that was received is indeed then being sent to the Board of Elections.

There was a brief discussion regarding this procedure.

Supervisor Wagner stated that the Town obtained the number of votes for Governor in the last gubernatorial election and the document to Library Board has turned in has more than enough signatures. There is nothing in the statute that says that someone in the Town has to go through the petition and verify each signature; the challenge would have to come from someplace else.

Mr. Blass stated that this falls under the Education Law as well as Election Law Article four which states the 36 day time frame for filing and a publication notice requirement at least 10 days before the general election of the existence of this proposition on the ballot. Once the proposition leaves the Town, it becomes the jurisdiction of Board of Elections.

Councilman Jessup made a motion to close the public comment; seconded by Councilman O'Hare; carried unanimously.

Councilman Jessup made a motion to adjourn the meeting; seconded by Councilman O'Hare; carried unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

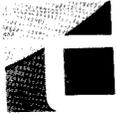

The Town of LaGrange received fourteen (14) bids for the Former Titusville Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) Demolition. The total base bid ranged from \$37,600 to 275,000. The low base bid in the amount of \$37,600 was received from Coyle Industries, Inc. A summary of the remaining bids are attached. The recommended construction budget for the work was \$100,000.

Non-Collusive Bidding Certificate and Bid Bond were provided.

Based on Clark Patterson Lee's (CPL) evaluation of the low bid received from Coyle Industries, Inc., CPL recommends that the Town Board award the contract to Coyle Industries, Inc. in the amount of \$37,600 for the base bid scope of work.
